Dear ISAE Members,

Continuing our tradition of supporting members' attendance at the ISAE congress, we have given travel awards to 18 worthy recipients. We are very grateful to Purina, Universities Federation for Animal Welfare (UFAW), and Humane World for Animals (formerly Humane Society International) for their generous sponsorship of most of these awards in addition to our own Congress Attendance Fund (CAF). These awards primarily go to students and early career researchers to assist them in presenting ethological research of interest to both the sponsors and our membership. Finally, as part of our Developing Countries Congress Attendance Fund (DCCAF), we will be welcoming 14 people from Bangladesh, Brazil, Chile, Ghana, India, Kenya, Nepal, Nigeria, North Macedonia, and Pakistan to the ISAE Congress. This funding is part of an on-going grant from Open Philanthropy and continues our mission of widening the reach of the ISAE across the world. Continuing our efforts to make ISAE an inclusive and welcoming society, Linda Greening and the EDIA committee have created an EDIA award to recognize an ISAE member who is promoting inclusivity in the field of applied ethology. Please read Linda's newsletter article for more details and consider nominating a colleague who is doing work in this area! As we have done for the past few years, we will again have allies wearing green ribbons at the congress. If you have

questions, feel uncomfortable or need to report something, please reach out to an ally or to any ISAE council member. If you would like to be a conference ally, please let the student representatives (Mostafa Farghal and Victor Brusin), Linda Greening or any other council member know.

Hopefully most of you have renewed your membership for the coming year (June 1 – May 31) and found it a bit easier to do than in the past. Myself, Abdelkareem Abdallah, and past membership secretary Gemma Charlton along with new assistant to the membership secretary Rosie Whittle have been working with our membership company to smooth out the current system. Going forward we will be working with the Royal Society for Biology's (RSB) membership services to handle applications, renewals, and contact details among other things. So, if you notice a pause in your ability to renew or access the members features, along with a new look, that's why! The RSB team works with nearly dozen other societies and are comfortable with the ins and outs of helping a volunteer council meet the needs of a diverse membership. Finally, I know that no one likes to see an increase in membership fees, but the reality is we hadn't adjusted our dues in years, and we needed to do so to keep up with rising costs of services we need to function as a society. Council Position Vacancies

In 2025, three council positions will be open. Please read the descriptions of the positions below and consider submitting an application.

 Junior Vice President. The Junior Vice President coordinates regional activities including communicating with Regional Secretaries, organizing gatherings at annual congresses, reporting regional activities at Council Meetings, and working with the treasurer to allocate regional funds. The Junior Vice President also assumes the duties of the President if absent or unable to serve. The Junior Vice President serves a 2-year term. After 2 years, the Junior Vice President will be voted to move up to the role of President for 2 years, then Senior Vice President for 2 years.

- 2. Secretary. The Secretary's duties include arranging ISAE Council and business meetings, recording meeting minutes and compiling the ISAE newsletters, among other duties. The Secretary typically serves a 4-year term.
- 3. Junior Editor. The main responsibilities of the Junior Editor include assisting the Senior Editor with the annual special issue of *Applied Animal Behaviour Science* and helps to coordinate the Help-with-English scheme. The Junior Editor usually serves a 2-year term. After 2 years, the Junior Editor will be voted to move up to the role of Senior Editor for a 2-year term.

If you are interested in serving on the ISAE council, please submit your application materials to Carly O'Malley (<u>comalley15@gmail.com</u>), including 1) a paragraph outlining your interest in the position and relevant skills, and 2) your 2-page CV to be shared with ISAE Members. Applications should be submitted by **July 28, 2025**. Nominations will be reviewed and voted on at the AGM at the 2025 congress.



Finances

Treasurer's Mid of Year Report

The report contains the mid-year summary for the period **January 1st to June 1st 2025.** The table is the edited output generated from the Xero accountancy software that ISAE now subscribes to via our accountants (Henderson-Loggie). It reports the revenue and expenses in all 3 HSBC bank accounts (deposit, current and Euro) and our WISE account to manage the Open Philanthropy (OP) grant. The report is in GBP after having reconciled the Euro and USD transactions, which results in a "foreign exchange loss". This mostly reflects changes in the exchange rate for USD:GBP over the year. The OP grant is managed in USD so this loss is only calculated for the purposes of summarising the accounts. The table has adjusted income and expenditure and compares with the annual report for 2024.

INCOME. The accounts are healthy. Our income from membership subscriptions is steady (£10,746.40) and expected to be increased this year compared with last year due to the

membership dues increase as of 1st May 2025. The main revenue is from **Scholarship funds from sponsors** (£112,908.41). This includes the second payment of the new **Open Philanthropy (OP) grant** (2023-2026 – Part 2 £101,612.15) from Good Ventures to support the DCCAF scholars and other OP activity. Other sponsorships funding attendance and events at the 2025 congress include the **Purina award** (£11,296.26) and the **Humane world award**. The Humane world award for this year has been confirmed but not yet paid so does not appear (£6161.80). These scholarship funds will be transient and reimbursement for scholarships will be paid after the Congress (some OP DCCAF scholarships have already been paid to facilitate travel visas).

EXPENDITURE. Scholarships and charitable activities account for most of our expenditure (£46,130). ExOrdo (congress management) charges have decreased from 2024, because the 2024 payments included outstanding payments from 2023. Our bank charges remain high due to international transfer fees. Other expenditure includes the usual payments to Intergage and Opayo for membership services, as well as reimbursement to council members for costs incurred for managing the social media accounts (Planable). Audit and accountancy fees were invoiced (£2,794.80) after the mid year report date and are not included in the table.

Our 2024 accounts have been prepared for inspection by our accountants and will soon ready to be submitted to the Office of the Scottish Charity Regulator (OSCR).

Congress News

58th ISAE Congress – Utrecht, The Netherlands, 4-8 August 2025



Preparations are well advanced for the 2025 ISAE Congress in Utrecht, The Netherlands. The congress theme is *a good life for all animals*. The Wood-Gush memorial lecture will be given by Meghan Barrett, with plenary talks by Sarah Adcock, Leopoldo Stuardo, Claudia Vinke and Christian Nawroth. There is still time to register to participate either in person or online. Further information (including the congress programme) is available on the congress website: <u>https://isae2025utrecht.nl</u>.

For those still planning your travel to Utrecht, don't forget that Utrecht train station is well connected to the European rail network, and travel to Utrecht by train **within a day** is possible from many European cities (see the train travel guide from Utrecht University: https://www.uu.nl/sites/default/files/trainzonemap-en-v2.pdf).

For those travelling from outside Europe, you can probably reduce your carbon footprint by choosing an international flight that arrives in Europe as close as possible to Utrecht. The best option here is Amsterdam Schiphol (AMS) airport. There are up to four trains an hour from Schiphol to Utrecht and the journey takes just 30 minutes. Otherwise, Frankfurt airport (FRA) is just over 3 hours by train from Utrecht, and the train from Paris Charles de Gaulle (CDG) airport to Utrecht takes about 4 hours.

We have now returned to our pre-pandemic pattern of alternating between European and non-European locations:

2026: 59th ISAE Congress – New Delhi, India, early August 2026 (details below) 2027: 60th ISAE Congress – Vienna, Austria, late July or early August 2027

Please note that an ally is not expected to:


- To solve problems on the spot.

Pride Month

At the time of writing, we are in June, which is Pride celebration month. But what is the history of this celebration? In June 1969, police raided the Stonewall Inn, a gay bar in New York City. This sparked a series of spontaneous protests and demonstrations against the ongoing harassment and discrimination faced by LGBTQ+ people. The Stonewall Riots are widely considered the catalyst for the modern LGBTQ+ rights movement. A year later, on June 28, 1970, the first Pride marches were held in New York, Los Angeles, Chicago, and San Francisco to commemorate the anniversary of the Stonewall uprising. Pride events are now hosted globally during the month of June to remember the anniversary of Stonewall and to celebrate LGBTQ+ culture, identity, and achievements.

Pride events also help to raise awareness of the ongoing struggle for LGBTQ+ equality and rights. ISAE celebrates members who are part of, or allies to, the LGBTQ+ community.

Selection of new ISAE Country Liaison Officers

At the ISAE January Council Meeting held on the 31st of January, 2025, three candidates were presented for the position of Nigeria liaison and one candidate for China liaison officer. The council approved the following as the new ISAE country liaison officers:



ISAE China Country Liaison Officer: Dr Yifei Yang recently completed a PhD in animal welfare at the University of Queensland (Australia), with a focus on the welfare of freshwater fish during live transport. This research was part of the International Animal Welfare Standards Project (https://animal-toolbox.org/), conducted in collaboration with Zhejiang University (China) and the University of Stirling (UK). Yifei was one of the recipients of the 2023 ISAE Developing Countries Congress Attendance Fellowship (DCCAF).

ISAE Nigeria Country Liaison Officer: Dr. Ayoola Abidemi Oluyemi is a registered animal scientist in Nigeria and an academic staff member at the Department of Agricultural Science and Technology, College of Technology, Bamidele Olumilua University of Education, Science and Technology, Ikere Ekiti, Ekiti State, Nigeria. Her research focuses on environmental enrichment of growing pigs using locally available materials to improve the welfare of pigs. She has been helping pig farmers in her region reduce the cost of construction, reconstruction and replacement of pen components. She is also passionate about other farm animal behaviour and welfare research. She was one of the DCCAF awardees in 2023.

6th and 7th ISAE Workshops in Bangladesh

Two powerful workshops sparked a national shift in how animal welfare is viewed in Bangladesh, thanks to the tireless work of Dr Jashim Uddin, ISAE's Country Liaison Officer in Bangladesh. In May 2025, the 6th and 7th ISAE Workshops were held at Gazipur Agricultural University (May 21) and Jashore University of Science and Technology (May 24). The workshops centred on the inspiring theme: "All Animals Deserve a Good Life: Understanding Animal Behaviour as a Pathway to Enhanced Animal Welfare".

Impact of ISAE workshops in Bangladesh:

- Animal behaviour and welfare are now being taught in undergraduate programmes across many Bangladeshi universities.
- The government is now funding research in animal welfare.
- Workshop feedback showed that 85–91% of participants believe ISAE is critical to improving regional animal welfare standards.

Finally, he also coordinates the local ethics committee and promotes open science at his institution.

After lunch our second plenary speaker, Emeritus Professor Bob Elwood from Queen's University Belfast, delivered a fascinating talk detailing his work exploring if crustaceans feel pain, including how his work has influenced animal welfare legislation in the UK. Talks from other delegates covered many topics across applied animal behaviour, including human behavioural change, precision livestock farming, personality assessment, and welfare improvement. As with other regions, the ISAE regional conference prides itself on supporting students, and this year was no exception. Thanks to support from the ISAE council we were able to provide a prize for the best student talk. We were delighted to award Lucy Markland (Teagasc Moorepark) with the presentation prize of entrance to the next ISAE international congress. Lucy presented her work on play and manipulative development in piglets.

We are excited to announce that we will be holding our next regional conference in the UK next year (2026), to bring the meetings back to the pre-COVID schedule, so our regional meetings will once again take place when the international meeting takes place outside of Europe.
